

The June 16, 2010 regular/work meeting was called to order by Mayor Petillo at 6:34 p.m. in the Municipal Building, 111 River Styx Road, Hopatcong, NJ.

Mayor Petillo announced this meeting is held in accordance with the 1975 Open Public Meetings Act, NJSA 10:4-6 et seq., annual notice having been forwarded to the New Jersey Herald/New Jersey Sunday Herald, the Daily Record, The Star Ledger, and posted on the bulletin board maintained in the Municipal Building for public announcements.

ROLL CALL: Councilmembers present – Howard Baker, Richard Bunce, Michael Francis, Marie Galate, Madeline McManus & John Young. Others present: Attorney John Ursin, Administrator Catherine Steinel & Clerk Lorraine Stark.

Councilperson Bunce moved resolution for closed session at 6:35 p.m., seconded by Galate. The vote was unanimous. Mayor Petillo reported the matters to be discussed pertained to Police Grant opportunities and Tax Appeals.

Continue open session at 7:35 p.m.

MOMENT OF SILENT REFLECTION AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

PRESENTATION: Municipal Budget by Auditor Paul Lerch of Lerch, Vinci & Higgins, LLP. Mayor Petillo introduced Borough Auditor Paul Lerch. Mr. Lerch had prepared a Power Point presentation to explain the 2010 Fiscal Year Budget; he noted that he has broken the information down to make it easier to understand. He began by explaining the revenues, which has increased a total of 2.3%. Mr. Lerch informed those present that the budget's two components consist of revenues and expenditures, and that you have to look at these into 2011, not just 2010. He provided graphs that explained where the Budget dollars come from: General Taxation, Delinquent Taxes; Miscellaneous; State & Federal Grants, State Aid, Municipal Revenue & Surplus Anticipated. Regarding the Budget Spending, he explained those line items that increased such as the Reserve for Uncollected Taxes, and Statutory & Fixed Charges that the Borough has no control over such as pension fees. Paul provided a slide explaining where the 2010 Budget Appropriation dollars go. Overall the average Hopatcong homeowner will be faced with an increase of \$116. For every dollar collected 28 cents is for Municipal, 53 cents is for the School and 19 cents for the County. Mr. Lerch stated that 2010 was a difficult year, and hopefully 2011 would not be as difficult.

1) Public Hearing – Mayor Petillo open the meeting to the public for the questions. Irving Ellner a resident from 133 Marla Road inquired about the repaving budget and what percentage of the monies budgeted were for roads within the sewer area. Mr. Ruschke responded that he believed a high percentage were within the sewer area; the DPW Superintendent identifies the roads that are going to be paved. Mr. Ellner also wanted to know where in the budget is the maintenance of the tennis courts and who is responsible. Councilman Young responded that he believes we share the cost for maintenance with the Board of Education. Administrator Steinel reported that the Civic Center was our responsibility; monies budgeted in a line item found on page 40C. Mr. Ellner questioned what could be done with the solar panels for the landfill for only \$30,000, and if this was a viable project. Mrs. Steinel commented that yes, this was a viable project, and that we were looking to bond the money; the Borough had to put money upfront before it could get their money back. Regarding the Budget Summary Sheet, Mrs. Steinel explained that an employee was added to the Water Utility and that employee salaries were being split between the water & sewer accounts; wages & salaries line decreased due to the lay-offs last year. In addition, Administrator Steinel noted that some expenses were now properly aligned to where they belong, and that not all revenues were shown at this time because we have not received a commitment for some of the grants (referring to Police Department for one). Councilperson Bunce moved to close public hearing for budget, seconded by Baker. Those present voted affirmative.

Councilwoman Galate thanked the Finance Committee, Administrator and CFO for their hard work on the budget. Councilman Bunce commented that our financial situation is changing for the better. Mayor Petillo thanked Paul Lerch for his presentation, which was very informative, and thanked him for his leadership.

2) #231-10 Adoption of 2010 Municipal Budget, moved by Council President Francis, seconded by Bunce. Roll Call Vote: **YES** – Francis, Bunce, Galate, Young & Baker. **PRESENT** – McManus.

Mayor Petillo called for a ten minute recess before introducing her two guests.

Meeting continued at 8:11 p.m. Mayor Petillo thanked those in attendance for coming, and said that she wanted to take this opportunity to honor two of our firemen for their 50 years of service; always a pleasure to honor a lifetime commitment for community service from Marty Rosenbaum, a member of

Northwood Engine Company #2 and Jim Sutton, a member of Defiance Engine Company #3. Mayor Petillo thanked Marty & Jim for the 50 years of dedication to the residents of Hopatcong. A brief recess was held to serve cake.

Continued open session at 8:29 p.m.

PUBLIC COMMENT: Meeting open to public for comments on items on the agenda for which no public discussion is provided. (Comments limited to 5 minutes). Larry Kron said that he was present to discuss item B under new business, request for sewer allocation. Mr. Ruschke revealed that an application was filed in 2008, and it is unclear whether or not a sewer allocation was issued. He commented that the system could accept this home, recommended that it be accepted from June 2008. Mr. Kron stated that they agree to pay for any back fees. Resolution #256-10- Authorize Sewer Allocation for Blk. 40105, Lots 4 & 26 retro-active to June 2008, Councilman Bunce moved, seconded by Young. Those present voted affirmative, except for an abstention by Galate.

Mara Modes a resident of 3 Ithanel Road inquired about the Clothing Bin at Firehouse #4, and if the clothing was going to be shredded.

Administrator Steinel responded that a notice would be placed on the bin informing the public whether or not the items would be shredded.

Councilwoman Galate moved to close the public comment period, seconded by Bunce. The vote was unanimous.

Council President Francis moved approval of regular/ work meeting April 21, 2010, regular meeting May 5, 2010, seconded by Young. The vote was unanimous. Councilperson Bunce moved approval of special meeting May 10, 2010, seconded by Galate. Those present voted affirmative, except for an abstention by Baker.

ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT: Mrs. Steinel reported that the resolution regarding the "Best Practices" is to let the State know that we have a plan; commit in writing that we have a written plan and would be putting it into practice.

Emergency Repairs Resolution - Administrator Steinel informed those present that 3 quotations for the air conditioning repairs were received, and the only way to move forward with the repairs was to declare a health emergency. The monies are in the 2010 Capital Budget, but due to the timing we had to move forward in this manner. She requested that the governing body look favorably on this resolution.

DPW JIF Certificate - The Department of Public Works has been given a Certificate of Achievement and awarded \$300 for safety equipment. The JIF performed unscheduled safety inspections, and the DPW received outstanding results.

Department of Environmental Protection - The Borough has received notice that the DEP wants the weekend water tests, now requiring water

sampling 7 days a week. Mrs. Steinel commented that she thought that a plan was in place; however the employees reneged on the arrangement. Rob Lawler has taken over this responsibility, and is doing the water testing on the weekends. Administrator Steinel suggested that a reasonable stipend for the 52 weeks per year would be \$5,000. No action was taken at this time.

ENGINEER'S REPORT: John Ruschke was present.

Streetscape Project – Mr. Ruschke reported that the pre-construction meeting was scheduled for tomorrow, and that the bids were below the grant fund amount.

2010 Paving Program – Mr. Ruschke has prepared bid specs because last year the bid price was below the Morris County Co-Op and there are other benefits to having a bid contractor pave the roads instead of the Morris County C-OP vendor. The consensus was to proceed with advertisement of bid.

Water System Update – The DEP has issued authorization to activate the Marine and Bay view Wells; both require some capital improvements. John also noted that he was trying to avoid treating for iron content, and that he continues to work with the DEP on activating the Rand Street Well.

Elba Point Project – John Ruschke revealed that the DEP is showing disapproval of this project, however, they have provided some guidance. One of the issues is that this would be an emergency backup system, and told the Borough to look at other municipal connections suggesting Roxbury and Stanhope; Mrs. Steinel sent letters to these municipalities. Mr. Ruschke cited several problems with Roxbury and Stanhope, such as distance and additional costs. He is looking into the options that are available to Hopatcong. He also noted that we have a million dollar grant and the Borough must spend 2 million on a project to receive the full million dollars. Mr. Ruschke informed those present that the DEP is requiring a portable emergency generator. Mr. Ruschke stated that he may recommend a project that meets our immediate needs.

Councilperson Bunce said that he was not interested in a pipe line to Roxbury or Stanhope; did not want to spend a fortune lying pipe. Mayor Petillo remarked that we are looking at all of our options to improve our source for water. She thanked Mr. Ruschke.

Dibert Road Vacation – Mr. Ursin reported that some time ago a resident asked to buy the property to build a 2 car garage. Both he and John Ruschke looked at this site and it is not practical to vacate this property; we would have to give up more than 50% of the right of way, which is not a good idea. Mr. Ruschke recommended that the resident pay for a property survey to determine to what extent this structure would infringe within the ROW. Councilman Bunce said that he looked at the property and does not have a problem with the vacation of this land. Council President Francis commented that he would like to see an accurate picture/survey with the dimensions of the structure. Mr. Ursin explained

that there are going to be hundreds of requests if you permit this one; one-half of the vacation would go to each property owner, and the Borough could not charge for this land. If you asked his advice, he would say that this was not a good policy. Councilmember McManus said that she for one will vote against this; we would be setting bad policy. Council President Francis remarked that each request stands on its own merit, not necessarily establishing a broad policy. Mr. Ursin will tell the homeowner that the governing body members will look at the property, and that he should get a survey and make the area where the garage is to be constructed marked so that they could better visually see what is being proposed.

Mayor Petillo informed those present that she would like a motion to move F. in the consent agenda, the resolution for the St. Jude Rosary Society to item J. under resolutions, moved by Bunce, seconded by Galate. Those present voted affirmative. Mayor Petillo noted that because we didn't have another meeting, these would be contingent upon the clerk receiving the complete paperwork.

Open to the public for comment. Heinz Torster a resident of 137 Marla Road, inquired what precisely does

the bonds cover. He was referred to a copy of the ordinance that was available to the public. He also wanted to know what the interest rate for this bond would be. Administrator Steinel explained that all this ordinance does was to authorize the capital improvements; it does not authorize the debt. She provided an explanation on how the various items might be funded in the future, and that the market was unpredictable right now. Mr. Torster questions if this needed to be put to the voters. Mrs. Steinel responded no only the schools were required to do that. Ordinance moved by Council President Francis, seconded by Bunce. Roll Call Vote: **YES** - Francis, Bunce, Galate, Young & Baker. **PRESENT** - McManus.

B. Public Hearing Ord. #12-2010 BOND ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR VARIOUS 2010 WATER UTILITY IMPROVEMENTS, BY AND IN THE BOROUGH OF HOPATCONG, IN THE COUNTY OF SUSSEX, STATE OF NEW JERSEY (THE "BOROUGH"); APPROPRIATING \$100,000 THEREFOR FROM THE WATER UTILITY OF THE BOROUGH AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$71,400 BONDS OR NOTES OF THE BOROUGH TO FINANCE PART OF THE COSTS THEREOF. Councilman Bunce questioned if this resolution was changed from the first draft they received. Mr. Ursin remarked that they were only agreeing to a dialog without making any commitment. Councilperson Bunce noted that the earlier one make more of a commitment. Motioned by Francis, seconded by Young. The vote was unanimous.
- F. #245-10 Approve 2010 Summer Recreation Program Fees as recommended by the Recreation Commission. Motioned by Young, seconded by Bunce. Those present voted affirmative.
- G. #246-10 Approve 2010-11 Liquor License Renewals. Motioned by Bunce, seconded by Galate. Councilmember Galate stated that we couldn't do anything about getting our taxes; they should be paying the Borough the taxes owed. Administrator Steinel commented that the governing body could hold up the Entertainment License for non-payment of taxes if they wished. The vote was unanimous.
- H. #247-10 Approve 2010-11 Entertainment License- Garden State Yacht Club. Mayor Petillo informed those present that Cast-A-Ways has a problem because he has a 13 year old that likes to sing karaoke and a 16 year old who plays the guitar; the ordinance does not permit this. Councilman Bunce said "that's the

way it is then; thirteen year olds should not be in bars". Mayor Petillo responded that was the answer. Ms. Stark reported that Gang Plank owes first and second quarter taxes. Mr. Ursin revealed that the governing body could withhold the Entertainment License until taxes were paid. Mrs. Steinel remarked that this was a brand new license, and businesses were currently operating without a license; the effective date for this new license is July 1, 2010. Mayor Petillo noted that we did not have a meeting scheduled before that date. Administrator Steinel reported that the next meeting was July 21st, and that a resolution could be issued contingent on the payment of taxes. Motioned by Bunce, seconded by Francis. Roll Call Vote: **YES** – Bunce, Francis, Baker, Galate, McManus, Young.

- I. #248-10 Approve 2010-11 Entertainment License – Cast-A-Way Tavern, contingent upon payment of outstanding taxes. Motioned by Bunce, seconded by Francis. Those present voted affirmative.
- J. #249-10 Approve 2010-11 Entertainment License – Northwood Inn/Kabob's pending approval of application and payment of outstanding taxes. Motioned by Francis, seconded by Young. The vote was unanimous.
- K. #250-10 Approve Fees for Tennis Program as recommended by Recreation Commission. Motioned by Young, seconded by Galate. Those present voted affirmative.
- L. #251-10 Authorize grant application for the 2010 Statewide Crackdown program. Motioned by Galate, seconded by Francis. The vote was unanimous.
- M. #252-10 Authorize Raffle Licenses #16, #17, & #18 –2010 for St. Jude Rosary Society, pending completeness of applications, moved by Galate, seconded by Bunce. The vote was unanimous.

OLD BUSINESS:

A. Requests to install a fence in ROW at 28 Wildwood Shores Dr.; not a prior existing structure. Mayor Petillo stated that she and Council President Francis visited the site and did not see a problem with a new fence. Councilman Bunce acknowledged that he too looked at the property and was in agreement. Council President Francis informed those present that the Borough had required that the property owner keep the historic wall that was located on his property. Resolution # 252-10 Approve the installation of a fence in the ROW at 28 Wildwood Shores Drive, moved by Francis, seconded by Young. Roll Call Vote: **YES** – Francis, Young, Baker, Bunce, Galate, McManus.

B. Clothing Shed Bin – Administrator Steinel reported that Mr. Ruschke said that the bid was in order. Mr. Ruschke informed those present that he did review the bid, and didn't see any problem with it. Mrs. Steinel noted that in the contract it would be defined whether or not the clothing would be shredded so that the public would know. Mr. Ursin

revealed that the bid specifies that the clothing be usable and not shredded. Resolution – #254–10 Clothing Shed Bid for Hopatcong Hills Fire Company #4 – Award Bid to Turnkey Enterprises, LLC, moved by Francis, seconded by Young. The vote was unanimous.

C. Goldmeier property sewer charges – #255–10 Approve notice of connect for 144 Brooklyn Stanhope Road, reset sewer charge date. Mayor Petillo noted that the property owner never received a notice to connect. Motioned by Bunce, seconded by Young. Those present voted affirmative.

Councilmember Galate inquired if they could go back to Ordinance #16–2010; she voted in favor and would like to abstain, which was her original intent. After giving this request some thought, Mr. Ursin reported that if she felt that she had a conflict in this matter, she should have the opportunity to set the record straight and re–vote on the ordinance. The proper procedure would be to bring the issue back up and re–vote. Councilman Bunce moved to re–vote on Ordinance #16–2010, seconded by Francis. Roll Call Vote: **YES** – Bunce, Francis, McManus, Young & Baker. **ABSTAINED** – Galate.

NEW BUSINESS:

A. Informational – Hopatcong DPW Certificate of Achievement Award from JIF in the amount of \$300 for safety equipment.

B. Sewer application for Block 40105 Lots 4 & 26, 8–8A Keith Road (Chaplin Homes). This matter was authorized earlier in the meeting.

Mayor Petillo read a letter from Basil Castrovinci a resident of Hopatcong for over 11 years. In his letter Mr. Castrovinci acknowledged that he had two unpleasant incidents that required attention by the Hopatcong Police Department. He found his dealings with the police personnel to be efficient and the officers to be professional, detail oriented, courteous and extremely competent. He encouraged the governing body to continue to provide a viable Police Department staffed with the same character of officer he met during his incidents.

COMMITTEE REPORTS: Councilperson Young reported that the Recreation Commission met last night and they were moving ahead with the Summer Recreation Program, the rates remain the same as 2009. Summer Basketball is underway, and that there were 27 contestants for the 4 age groups during the Ms. Hopatcong Pageant. The following were selected as the Pageant Winners: Little Ms. Megan Redstone, Mini Ms. Christy Brennan, Junior Ms. Alexis Mott & Ms. Hopatcong Cristina Pena. He thanked everyone who worked at making this pageant a success. Council President Francis noted that we don't want to rush into a solar project, reviewing some new legislation that would be beneficial to the town. We plan on continuing with our efforts, and see how things play out.

Councilperson McManus said that the Environmental Commission was busy with several projects, every member was working diligently, and there would be a table at Hopatcong Days manned by Commission members.

Councilman Bunce reported that the Borough was working with the N.J. Land Conservancy on a number of properties that have been offered for donations, and we just introduced an ordinance to sell a property to a contiguous owner. The Lake Hopatcong Commission has received two grants; these are for the weed harvesting program, which would be getting underway in the near future. He informed those present that water chestnuts have been found in a section of the lake, and asked that if residents find them to call the Lake Commission. Councilman Bunce remarked that the Lake Commission was also looking at receiving more funding in the future.

Mayor Petillo reported that there was money available to complete the project in Maxim Glen Park and there are plans to expand the field at Veteran's Field using Open Space money. Councilmember Young noted that type of field that was in short supply was baseball, and that type of field is not lighted at Veteran's. Mayor Petillo asked for volunteers for a committee to review ordinances. Howard Baker, John Young & Mike Francis volunteered their services. Howard was selected by Mayor Petillo as chairman.

PUBLIC COMMENT: (comments limited to 5 minutes). Louise Bagby Stevens Trail said that last December a resolution was adopted pertaining to the Highlands Act, at that time it was said that we would move forward with another step in June. She wanted to know what was happening. Mr. Ursin explained that December 8th, 2009 was the deadline for COAH, and Hopatcong has requested an extension. The Highlands Planning does not have a deadline.

Ms. Bagby inquired about the money for not opposing the power line project, and did we have the plans. Administrator Steinel said that we haven't received any money. The environmental impact has been discussed but we have not seen the PSE &G plans. Mr. Ursin informed those present that the construction in Hopatcong is in a very small (10 acres or less) and remote area behind the Quarry; there is no roadway to access that location.

Councilperson Bunce moved to close public comment period, seconded by Young. Those present voted affirmative.

COUNCIL COMMENTS: Councilwoman Galate remarked that everyone had a wonderful time at the Memorial Day Parade, and that Sue Parichuk organized the best parade to date. She also thanked the Finance Committee, as well as Elide & John Young for the wonderful Miss Hopatcong Pageant; she was glad that the Recreation Commission had brought this event back. July 10th & 11th Hopatcong Days, parade begins

at St. Jude on Saturday at 10 a.m.; informed everyone that there would be events and concessions at the park. In addition, the weekend would also encompass Emergency Services Day. Councilperson Galate thanked Marty and Jim for their combined one hundred years of service; they deserve a lot of credit for their commitment. She said that the DPW award was in part due to the good management of the department, and that our Police are the unsung heroes in our community. Mrs. Galate remarked that without Catherine our budget would be in shambles, thanking her for the leadership. Wished everyone a good night and thanked them for coming.
